Greetings as we enter our Holy Week celebrations: the High Holy Days of our Faith.

The celebrations take us back to the very origin of our faith, to the events of that fateful Jewish Passover when Jesus was subjected to a mockery of a trial, scourged to the point of near death and then crucified. It was a particularly 'Solemn Passover', solemn because the Sabbath in that year of the death of Jesus, beginning with the weekly Passover Meal on the Friday at sunset, actually coincided with the fixed annual date for the originating Passover – 14th Nisan. (Nisan is the first month of the liturgical Jewish Calendar – end of March-April) Sometimes the 14th Nisan - commemorating the great Passover from slavery in Egypt 1,200 years earlier - would occur on a weekday which was not the Sabbath. The year Jesus was crucified it fell on a Saturday-the Sabbath.

The Passover meal centres around the symbolic acts concerning the selection and sacrificing of a lamb, recorded in the First Reading for the Holy Thursday Last Supper Mass. This ritual stretches back probably around 4,000 years to the very beginning of the nomadic Habiru (Hebrew) people. As nomads, at the conclusion of winter, they prepared to move out with their sheep and goats to find spring pastures. There were dangers associated with that. On the eve of their move they ate, together with unleavened bread, one of the lambs from their flock and daubed some of its blood on the tent pegs to ward off evil.

With the passage of time this little ceremony was repeated in Egypt where they were enslaved – and the door posts of their dwellings were daubed with the blood of the lamb on the eve of their great Passover from slavery to freedom under the leadership of Moses. The blood was to alert the 'avenging angel' which came to punish the Egyptian enslavers, that the people of the Abrahamic Covenant lived within and the angel of death 'passed over' those homes. Hence the origin of our word Passover (Exodus) – from slavery to freedom, from death to life, from homelessness to a homeland...

Applied to our lives, Passover means: a personal movement from the slavery of the diminishment of sin which impedes a fuller, more beautiful life, to a growth in authentic humanity through the unmerited gift of Christ's love. This love is mediated to us in the sacraments, prayer, our parish community of faith, and resulting in good works. Through his life within us, we enter into the pattern of Jesus' dying and rising, and are gifted with belief in eternal life in the community of heaven.

The sacrificial blood imagery from the ancient Hebrew rituals continues to this day – in the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of the Lord. The self-sacrificing life of Jesus, focused at Calvary, with its significance ultimately verified in the Rising of Jesus, is made present and effective for us in our day in the sacraments, especially the Mass. Christ meets us here and effects our personal 'passing over' from sin and death, from becoming mired in despair about ourselves and existence in general to people of hope. We are rescued by the gift of faith in Him who has conquered sin and death in every form. We become the people of the resurrection because of our unmerited union with the Resurrected One: "Unless you eat of the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood you will not have life within you…" Through the Eucharist, Jesus still does his best to gather us into a community of life in Him, keeping his memory fresh – not simply as something that happened 'back then', but which is made present and effective for us in Liturgical Time, here and now. The Mass extends in time the self-sacrificing loving presence of Jesus, His life laid down in humility and integrity to show us that no aspect of our human story is untouched or unreachable by the embrace of God.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper ushers in the three High Holy Days of our Faith. Let us come in large numbers, at least someone from every household, to this beautiful candle-lit Mass of the Lord's Supper. Here we remember and enter into the ongoing gift of Himself in humility and love as our Bread of Life, our consolation and our peace. Let us "keep watch with him" in His Suffering, and on the Third Day to rejoice in His, and our, Rising. This is central to our mission of *Being on Earth the Heart of Christ*. Peter Hearn MSC




